Reports to the Community

Dear Neighbor,

As we enter spring, I want to touch base with you about this year's budget and give you a recap of events in the community. Firstly, I want to thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as your New York State Assembly Member.

In recent weeks, we in the Assembly have worked for a budget to help all New Yorkers. Education is a vital discussion and investing in our children is very important. I am pleased to announce that New York students received a total of \$26.6 billion in education funding. That is an increase of \$914 million – or 3.6 percent – over the previous year and a 36 percent increase since 2012. We also increased higher education funding by allocating \$12.1 million to SUNY, and \$6.3 million to CUNY, to increase community college base aid by \$100 per full-time equivalent (FTE) student.


As the chair of the Subcommittee on Internet and New Technology, I am focused on jobs and business. It is critical that we provide New Yorkers with jobs to sustain our economy. In the budget, we invested \$1.36 billion to enable local businesses to grow and thrive and attract new businesses and jobs to the state.

Health care was also a major element in the budget where we protected important health programs, hospitals and facilities that provide care. A total of \$17.4 million was restored to existing programs, which ensure patients and their doctors have the final say in choosing medication in managed care and fee-for-service plans. We also added an increase of \$15 million for enhanced safety-net facilities that provide care to large Medicaid populations, for a total of \$25 million.

My priority is to ensure that the 33rd district benefits directly from the State budget. I encourage everyone to stay connected with me via social media and to engage in my electronic newsletter. Please send me your email address to participate.



COMMUNITY




