Legislative Spotlight



Passed Legislation:

A.1129 My health insurance bill passed unanimously in the Assembly on January 23rd and is currently awaiting a Senate vote. This bill limits the denial of coverage of treatment for which pre-authorization was granted. Essentially, this means you won't be denied coverage if you have a serious illness and need to be treated for other associated symptoms.

Reintroduction of Legislation:

(I am currently reintroducing six bills to the Assembly floor)

<u>A.1080</u> Requires the State University of New York and the City University of New York to examine and conduct a study on the availability of campus services, programs and resources for veteran students.

A.1081 Allows individuals to make a gift on their personal tax form for the New York State farm to school and garden fund.

A.1082 Requires the Commissioner of the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities and the Commissioner of Health, to develop a plan for reimbursement of transportation services to and from day programs for those with developmental disabilities.

A.1083 Establishes a task force on safety in school transportation.

<u>A.1105</u> Waives New York state application fees for honorably discharged veterans.

<u>A.1108</u> Requires agencies that provide grants and tax expenditures to make comprehensive information on these grants and expenditures accessible to the public on a searchable website.

Pending Legislation:

<u>Building Owner Contact Information</u>: This bill would require building owners and landlords to give their contact information to tenants.

Deficient Landlord Penalties: This bill that would allow tenants to deduct water payments from a deficient landlord.

Water Efficiency Standards: One of the biggest issues in our district is making sure we have safe drinking water for our children and our families. For this reason, I have drafted a bill that focuses on increasing our water efficiency standards by making stricter rules.

Disabled Housing: I am working on a bill that relates to people with disabilities being able to terminate their leases without penalty if the proper accommodations are not met.

Business Spotlight

This past month, I visited **Strong Hearts Cafe**, the area's only 100% Vegan Café. They are located at 719 East Genesee Street, just a few doors down from my office. I was able to spend some time with one of the co-owners, Joel Capolongo. We had a great conversation about the benefits and challenges of being a small business owner, the fondness for the location of Strong Hearts and the ideals and premise behind the creation of the business by Joel and his business partner, Nick Ryan.

The name Strong Hearts is based partly on the Native American Lakota Sioux Chief Crazy Horse and a quote attributed to him, "It is a good day to fight! It is a good day to die! Strong hearts, brave hearts, to the front! Weak hearts and cowards, to the rear!" The other meaning behind the name is the owners feel their products literally promote "strong hearts." Another fun fact: all milkshakes on the cafe's menu are named after figures the with Strong Hearts!

We also talked about Strong Hearts new social justice charity initiative. Throughout every month in 2017, they will be donating 50% of their proceeds from one days worth of sales from both their locations to a local or regional nonprofit group that they believe helps makes the community a better place. On **February 13th**, they will be donating 50% of their day's profits to InterFaith Works, and will be doing the same at Strong Hearts on the Hill, which is located right near SU's campus, on **February 18th**.
